

Technical Observations

Smurf with Inner Tube: Have you noticed? This figurine is not wearing a bathing suit!
He has a bare bottom! Will there be controversy over this figurine? Did "Peyo" approve this?
Stay tooned!

Sassette is finally technically correct (see Newsletter 7)! Her hair is orange and her freckles have been removed. Someone heard us!

As for Puppy, we've taken 3 steps back (see Newsletter 7)! Instead of being produced in the technically correct grey color, he is brown once again! What about his hot pink tongue?

The Smurf figurines appear to be approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ " smaller than the regular 2" figurines. We also note that the figurines and smurfboards are a one piece mold. These figurines are not glued onto the smurfboards.

Members: Have we missed any technical details? Write and let us know.

Do not confuse the Smurf's on Skateboards from Europe (Club Smurfgram, Summer 1990) with these Hardee figurines. The European figurines are on Skateboards (note the contours of the boards.) The Hardee's figurines are Surfboards! Completely different shaped boards.



Also, in late August, we began receiving mail informing us that some Applause figurines have started appearing in stores. We have only heard from two areas of the U.S. and information at this time is sketchy.

What we can confirm, at this point, is that no NEW designs have appeared. In other words, no Smurfs that we did not already know about have been issued.

Of particular interest; all Applause figurines will now bear the marking "Made in China." Hong Kong markings are no longer used, this holds true for all merchandise that used to be marked "Hong Kong." A new era begins! Those of you who collect items marked "Made in Occupied Japan" may find this to be especially significant.

Update on the € marking.

This will be the official marking used on all merchandise made for export from the twelve countries in the Community European known to us, in the U.S., as the European Community slated for completion in 1992. Under this new system, the Common Market countries (Belgium, Denmark, France, Great Britain, Greece, Ireland, and West Germany) will harmonize their trade policies and permit the free movement of goods across national boundaries.

Yes, Smurf figurine #20409, Marching Smurf with Flag, is strictly European and represents the 12 nation (Twelve Stars on the Flag) Community European!! This figurine, like many others, has no meaning in the U.S.

On June 28th, 1990, the 17th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards appeared on T.V. Sadly, not even an honorable mention for the Saturday morning Smurf cartoon.

A special thank you once again to our publicity editor, Elayne. This year's Club News Release was published in a major New York Newspaper, in fact twice! To all our members: Does the Newspaper in your town or city etc. publish a Hobbies and/or Collecting column or any feature about collectibles? Please send the Club the name and address of the publication. This past news release had an 84% success ratio. We are catching the eye of many, old and new Smurf Collectors alike. They are thrilled to hear we have a Club. Let's all help out!

Classic Properties

The Smurfs enjoy a decade of popularity in licensing and TV

The whimsical blue characters known as The Smurfs have enjoyed a decade of popularity both on television and as a licensed property. They are now being appreciated by a second generation of television viewers and are the subject of a new marketing thrust controlled by licensor Applause Inc.

Smurf products were first sold in North America in 1979, and the characters television series made its debut on NBC as a 60 minute show in 1981.

"The Smurfs have endured a generation of kids, and that's the first step in achieving the status of a classic," says the vice president of licensing, special markets and international sales for Applause Inc. "Ten years ago, the average age of a Smurf viewer was between five and eight years old. Within the next five years, that first generation of Smurf kids will start to become parents, which will create an adult following for the property."

Two major changes have affected the way the Smurfs are being presented to the "new generation" of viewers. Initially, The Smurflings characters were added to the Saturday morning series. These are child-aged Smurfs with child-like personalities. Also, beginning last fall, The Smurfs left their village for the first time as part of a time-travel theme. As the characters go back in time, they travel through history, wearing prehistoric garb and dealing with various historical scenarios.

"As far as we're concerned," comments Applause, "in the 1990's, The Smurfs will rate extremely high on Saturday morning and in syndication. More people are watching than ever, and the majority of the audience is new."

A new licensing strategy is also being implemented for the property. "We've been holding down licensing for the purpose of making sure that any merchandise remaining from the early '80's is sold through." Applause explains, "We want the marketplace to become clean and to create a demand for new licensed products by the new generation of kids."

The Smurfs will also be making a new fashion statement in the coming year, with several licenses signed for apparel, accessories and domestics. These licenses include Pilgrim Industries, PCA Apparel, Gerber, Changes, Springs Industries and Franco Mfg.

"Our goal is to continue to sign licenses with the strength of these companies, which have the design and distribution capabilities to reach the Smurf marketplace," Applause offers. "We will expand in 1990 with other strong companies which have the ability to make strong presentations."

The Applause gift company will also be introducing new gift items featuring The Smurfs.

Dear Peter:

The following is a direct answer to your question from "Peyo."

"The Smurfs' trip to the U.S. wasn't all smooth sailing. The thing that most surprised me when working with Americans is the extraordinary degree of censorship they impose on their creations. I thought the U.S. was a country of complete freedom, but it isn't true. Americans live in constant fear of what people will say and of minority groups."

Peyo says, for example, that in one of his stories the Smurfs turn from angelic blue characters to nasty black ones after being bitten by an insect. "The Americans told me black Smurfs were out of the question," he says, "but they liked the TV scenario, so we had to turn them into purple Smurfs."

RARE SCHLEICH MOLD UNEARTHED

The Mystery:

Some of us have Schleich's old catalogs from the '70's. In these old catalogs No. 20049, Tennis Star, appeared holding a red tennis racquet with white strings. See photo below:

As it appears in Schleich's old catalog and the Club catalog.

Pull out your old catalogs, if you have them, 'cause we have made a great discovery: Not only is this a variation, but it is a RARE OLD MOLD!!!!!!

What none of us had noticed is that by looking very closely at the photo of No. 20049 in the catalog you can see a shadow of an object behind the white strings. Check it out!! There is a ball attached to the racquet!!!! Why this was reversed we have no idea, but the ball does show through.

The Rare Mold:

Designed sometime before 1979, this rare mold produced a one-piece figurine!!! The Tennis racquet, red with white strings and yellow ball, is NOT a separate plastic piece inserted into the figurine's hand!! See below:



Invasion Of The SMURFS

When Belgian cartoonist Pierre (Peyo) Culliford created a tribe of little blue gnomes wearing white stocking caps to illustrate a children's book about 28 years ago, no one realized at the time just how popular these characters would become.

In English-speaking countries, they are called Smurfs. Germans know them as Die Schlumpfe, Italians call them Puffi, Spaniards refer to them as Los Pitufos, and they are known as Smolf in Scandinavia.

Whatever you want to call them, these little blue critters immediately caught the fancy of adults and children alike, and "Smurfomania" spread gradually throughout Europe until 1978, when British Petroleum started using Smurfs as a promotional item and distributed figurines, T-shirts, and posters at the petrol pumps.

All this commotion finally attracted the attention of Wallace Berrie & Co., an American novelty distributor based in Los Angeles, Cal., and the rest, as they say, is history.

We Yanks may have been late in discovering them, but Americans took the Smurfs to their hearts with a vengeance, and the Smurf-related licensing revenues from the Wallace Berrie company alone totalled over \$600 million in 1982, at retail prices.

The ubiquitous blue gnomes have shown up on toys, blankets, clothes, etc., and even hit the telly with a Saturday morning cartoon show by the famed Hanna-Barbera team which shot NBC right up to a No.1 rating for that time period.

The American Ertl company, of Dyersville Ia., jumped on the bandwagon with a series of Wallace Berrie-licensed circa 3" diecast vehicles which have proven very popular, and the Italian Burago company came in a little later with some larger Smurf vehicles based on existing castings. Apparently Burago set up a licensing agreement directly with creator Peyo Culliford.

Let's look at Ertl's offerings first. Ertl assigns serial numbers to all of their models, but the Smurf series also has its own numbering system stamped right on the baseplates, so I'll list both numbers.

No.1 (#1460) Smurfette. This is the lone female Smurf behind the wheel of a red VW Bug convertible with a yellow butterfly painted on the bonnet.



No.2 (#1462) Aero Smurf. A yellow biplane with red markings and red plastic propeller, piloted by a be-goggled member of the Smurf clan.



No.3 (#1465) Smurf-about. Apparently fashioned from a hollowed-out log, this vehicle is painted brown and it has a yellow plastic parasol protecting the Smurf driver from the elements.




No.4 (#1463) Papa Smurf. This white-bearded patriarch is driving a green roadster oddly reminiscent of an American hot rodder's street machine, complete with a flat-head V-8 out in the open and a classic "turtle deck" rear end.



No.5 (#1467) Gargamobile. The lines of this blue roadster suggest an SJ Duesenberg with its outside exhaust pipes and side-mounted spare tyre. The evil expression on the driver's face leaves no doubt that Gargamel is the "bad guy" of Smurfdom.






No.1 Smurf roadster with one of the two styles of boxes used by ESCI




The evil Gargamel in his purple roadster is No.5.

Bemused expression on Smurfette's face befits one driving a green frog




A black Smurf (!) in a home-made car is No.2 in the ESCI series

MORE SMURFS

As promised in my initial Smurf article (MAR 22) we are back to take a look at the Italian ESCI line of diecast Smurf models. These models were introduced in 1983 and they are about the same scale as the Ertl series; roughly 3 inches in length.

No.1. This red roadster, helmed by a smirking Smurf, appears to be of circa-1930's vintage. The black plastic baseplate extends out to form front and rear bumpers, running boards and the radiator.

No.2. Apparently a home-made vehicle this yellow contraption appears to be constructed from assorted bits and pieces including a log which forms the rear deck, a wooden box in the middle, and a barrel serving as the bonnet. The real shocker, however, is that the Smurf driver is black rather than the usual blue colour, and he is gritting his teeth ferociously.

No.3. Here is the kind of comic character which leaves me cold. Papa Smurf, the bearded patriarch of the Smurf clan, seems to be driving a brown shoe, and that's a little weird.

No.4. Speaking of weird, the Smurfette driving a green frog ranks near the top of the weirdness scale. I just can't understand why they put wheels under strange objects and stick a character model in them.

No.5. The evil Gargamel sneers over the windscreen of a generic sports roadster boasting outside exhaust pipes. Colour is purple.


No.6. Look! In that flashy red Can-Am racer! It's Super Smurf! Disguised by a black mask, bearing a yellow "S" on his scrawny chest, and wearing a flowing red cape, Super Smurf sets forth to thwart the evil plans of Gargamel.

No.7. Here we go again! Smurfette's vehicle on this occasion is an orange ear of corn. Well, I guess it's better than driving a frog!

No.8. A nice little pink roadster with cycle fenders up front and a black plastic baseplate which also forms injector tubes through a hole in the bonnet, exhaust pipes out the side, and a rear bumper out back. The driver is obviously a love-struck Smurf carrying a bouquet of posies to the Smurfette.



No.6 (#1461) The Smurf & Ladder Truck. Yes, it's a red fire truck driven by a grinning Smurf sporting the traditional fireman's hat with a drooping crown simulating the traditional Smurf stocking cap.



No.7 (#1466) Ol' McSmurf. An older model tractor in orange, helmed by Smurf's answer to "Ol' McDonald". A red neckerchief and yellow floppy-brimmed stocking cap complete the hayseed image.



No.8 (#1464) Handy. I'm not that familiar with the Smurf family, but this app-

ears to be a Smurf youngster wheeling a beige-coloured soapbox derby racer. Ertl produces a lot of their models in their own Dyersville, Ia. factory, but they also use suppliers in Hong Kong, Taiwan, Korea and even Mainland China. All of the models reviewed here are stamped "Made in U.S.A.", but I have seen at least one variation stamped "Made in China", so don't be surprised if you come across other versions produced in China and/or other Oriental countries.

Strangely enough, I believe all of the plastic Smurf figures in these vehicles are made in Mainland China and imported to the States.



The Italian Burago firm has produced only two Smurf vehicles that I know of, both of them based on 1:24 scale castings from the regular Burago line. No.1103, painted pink, has yellow plastic interior, and rolls on blue tyres, but this vehicle is based on the No.9103 Jeep CJ-7.

The two Smurfs riding in the Jeep seem to be prospectors of some kind, since the back of their vehicle is loaded with jerry-cans, provisions and a shovel. The bonnet does not open, but the folding windscreen is functional.

No.1104, normally available in more sedate colours, this version of the No.0179 Lamborghini Cheetah is light blue with pink interior and red tyres. Additional features include steerable front wheels and an opening rear deck which reveals a chromed plastic engine with a pink air cleaner.

There is a single Smurf behind the steering wheel, and the box art suggests that he is headed for the beach for a little fun in the sun and the surf. A miniature wind-surfing board stuffed into the car beside the driver can be assembled, but the poor Smurf is permanently



attached to his seat, so you'll have to purchase a Wallace Berrie Smurf figure (\$1.50 at your favourite dept. store) if you want to carry this charade any further!

There is yet another series of Smurf models produced by the Italian ESCI company, but I believe that they deserve a separate article, so I will cover them next time.

Dirty cash laundered in Calgary

'Smurfs' doing deeds

They're called Smurfs — innocent-looking people who are hired by criminals to launder their crime-related cash by depositing it at local banks and trusts.

Why "Smurfs"? No one seems to know, but most likely because the cute little blue and white cartoon characters are so lovable and so incapable of doing anything bad.

And that's exactly the way someone laundering tainted-money by funnelling it through legitimate institutions wants to be perceived.

"It could be anyone from a young kid to an old lady," says Michael Ballard, vice-president of the Canadian Bankers' Association.

The idea is to recruit someone who looks average who you'd never believe was handling criminals' money."

And this morning, a Calgary man is expected to become the second person in the Calgary area to be charged with money laundering.

Special provincial prosecutor Bruce Fraser said the man is ac-

cused of depositing about \$60,000 of stolen cash in a local bank. Police have a restraining order to stop withdrawals.

Fraser said the first laundering charges laid in this community were against Gordon Sanders last October.

He is accused of trying to conceal about \$80,000 that was allegedly stolen from his employer, a local oil firm, and is to go to trial this fall.

The maximum penalty for money laundering is 10 years in prison.

Neither Sanders nor the latest person to be charged are conventional Smurfs.

They're accused of handling their own criminal proceeds rather than someone else's and the alleged crimes didn't involve drugs.

But Fraser said that doesn't change the fact most Calgary-area money laundering is drug-related.

It's only a matter of time, as other police investigations proceed, before a Smurf is caught trying to pass off drug money, he predicted in an interview.

RCMP Cpl. Don Vander Graaf, a local Mountie who participated in the probe leading to today's arrest, noted it's been only 18 months since Bill C-61, the federal legislation outlawing money laundering, was passed.

He lists Calgary as Canada's fourth most popular money-laundering city after Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver.

"We're a financial centre," Vander Graaf says.

The city's proliferation of investment opportunities makes it an obvious target for money launderers. They channel their ill-gotten funds into various accounts, shifting it here and there to make its origins untraceable.

A recent U.S. report indicated there is a staggering \$85 billion US worth of money laundering in the United States and Europe annually, with a large chunk of it linked to Colombia's drug lords.


