Dear Smurf Collectors:

Although very nervous, Elayne tells us, "I felt that this was my chance to give back something to the Club that has brought me so much joy over the last few years. I was really happy to spread the word and it was good to see the Smurfs finally get the recognition they deserve."

SMURFS

Great players can come in small packages

THE LIST OF GREAT small players in NHL history is really short.

Five-foot-7, 160-pound Henri (The Penguin) Richard played for the Stanley Cup-winning teams in Montreal. Five-foot-6, 167-pound Dave Keon was a member of four Cup-winning teams in Toronto. Doug Jarvis, 5-9, 170 pounds, has the record ironman streak (963 games) and played on four Cup teams in Montreal. And the Hall of Fame Hall of Famers Yvan Cournoyer (5-7), Leo Boivin (5-7), Tim Lindsay (5-8) and Scotty Bowman (5-7).

Emile Francis, former Rangers coach and general manager and current head of the Canadian Hockey Association, is particularly fond of Ed Camille He

"The heaviest I ever saw him was 137 pounds," Francis said. "And he was a great player. He had great timing. We used Detroit to night and he got all four goals. He was a very good player. He had a deflection. He'd take it right out of the air like a guy laying down a bunt."

With more than half of the league's top 100 players at 5-10 or less, one possible conclusion is small players are making a comeback. The truth is,

"In every era there are X number of small guys," Devils executive vice president Max McFab said. "The average height of the NHL has been 6-2 and played 1947-53 at 173 pounds. My son Peter was 6-3 and played 1977-81 at 185. Players are just getting bigger and bigger. But speed and strength are more important than height."

The trend is in the case with 5-6 Theo Fleury, Calgary's leading goal scorer (with 34) and most exciting player. Almost every team in the league has at least one or two great small players.

The Islanders have 5-10 Bill Lafferty, who has scored 100 goals in 100 games for six consecutive seasons. Dave Gagner, 5-10, has totaled more than 100 points during the past three seasons for Minnesota. The top two goal scorers, Mark Recchi and John Cullen both approaching 100 points this season (5-7).

The trend in recent entry drafts is to ignore small players in the first round. Only one player under 6 feet was drafted in the first round since 1970. The prevailing theory is if you draft a little guy and he flunks, you cannot do anything with him; but if you draft a big guy, he's bound to be great, we might as well take a role player."

Small players tend to be drafted in middle or late rounds or again as free agents. That trend began after the 1974-75 season, when the New York Rangers fell victim to the bigger-is-better syndrome. They took 5-10, 190-pound Peter Wikström instead of 6-10, 200-pound Doug Wickenheiser instead of 6-10, 175-pound Dennis Savard. That season Savard had 1,013 career points, Wikström 276. The Rangers obtained Savard last June in a trade with Chicago.

"There's an awful lot of small players that don't make it," said Rangers coach David McFab, an

Olympic team coach, coached a Rangers team (1961-62) nicknamed "The Smurfs" because it had so many small, swift players.

"It's been three or four straight years [in the playoffs]," Brooks said. "Staying is very important, variable. It always was with the great Montreal teams. The Flyers, the men. The great teams in history were good skating teams."

The sizeable belief among scouts is that small players who reach the NHL do so by being instinctive and having a natural sense of balance. They are more likely to become complacent after they arrive.

"Small players have been told their coaches are going to teach them it," David McFab said. "They've had to learn to compensate. By the time they get to the NHL, they've learned a lot of tricks."

Jarvis, now an assistant coach with Minnesota, said, "One thing is small players have to work harder. He has to get that extra step. And he has to play a thinking game. He's going to be behind the net, he's going to be off the puck but he's got to be there and compete for loose pucks. He can't let himself get tied up in a slow area. He's got to be quick and hard a swat."

Minnesota's 5-6, 175-pound Curt Gile, in his 12th season, is NHL's best small defenseman. "I've never thought of myself as smaller than anybody else," he said. "I've never thought of myself as being in gain position on [big players]. The big thing is to deny them the puck — take the puck and hard a swat."

Fleury was an eighth-round 1987 Calder draft pick despite getting 50 goals and 100 points in his final year of junior hockey. Max McFab said, "Fleury was written off by a lot of people. He was a small player. He's a foolish bigger player since he started to play. If he battled his way up here, about now, he has a fear of playing with big players."

During Mario Lemieux's injury absence this season, Cullen filled the Pittsburgh offense with and was named to the Wales Conference All-star team. Penguins director of player development, Randy Bowman said of Cullen, "He doesn't let the size push away. He can pull players out of position and buy time for his teammates. He's confident he can beat a man one-on-one."

Of Cullen's linemate, right-wing Recchi, a fourth-round 1987 Calder pick, he said, "He can accelerate pretty quickly, he goes in traffic and he plays a lot bigger than his size."

That's what observers said about 5-8 Marcel Dionne, but he's like Fleury, he's used to knock of the puck. Dionne retired after the 1988-89 season as the NHL's No. 2 all-time goal scorer (721) and No. 10 in points.

The consensus best small player available in this June's draft is Spokane's 5-10, 192-pound center Peter Wikström. "I'd hate to see a small player," The Hockey News' Tom Fitzgerald said.

David McFab said, "You can pretty well project he [Wikström] is going to be an outstanding player. The question is, what part is he going to be durable enough?" Scouts asked the same thing about Dionne in 1971.

Dear Suzanne,

Thank you for your note. I was so pleased to hear that you and your members enjoyed my article in Doll World.

You are definitely right - I did not realize that the little guy photoed is one of the rarer variations. I bet a lot of Smurfers had a good chuckle over it!

It's great to hear that you are adding new members to the Club as a result of my article. I know there are many collectors who keep their Smurf collections a secret, so perhaps if they see an article about Smurfs they will come out of the closet (so to speak!).

I recently met a Canadian Member of the S.C.C.I., and she had nothing to say but praise for the Club and your informative Newsletter.

Keep up the great work. I'm sure all Smurf lovers will be thankful for it!

Thanks again for your help on the article, and for taking the time to write.


