Dear Smurf Collector,

Another Summer has come and gone! Did you all enjoy a successful Smurfy shopping season browsing through garage sales, flea markets, toy shows, etc.? Reports coming in to Club Headquarters from the U.S. and Europe are fair in respect to finding old, rare, and unique Smurf Collectibles. How did you fare? We would love to know!

We have received word from members in a few countries in Europe that one "HOT" collectible this past year has been the Ferrero (Kinder Egg) line of figurines. A Price Guide has been written in German. We have one of these German Price Guides and we are in the process of translating it into English. We are also attempting to get the latest market conditions and prices as we have had a number of reports that the published prices have already increased two to three times the guide's values. We will pass this information along when it is completed and, as is our practice, thoroughly investigated. Please refer to our Club articles on this topic starting back in 1988: Newsletters Nos. 9, 15, 17, and 25.

The Club has been receiving an overwhelming amount of mail requesting information about store display items, counter display items, etc. used for Smurf Products. These items have become a very popular cross-over collectible in the last few years and we are very pleased to report that Smurf items are included and sought after in this collectible field. Wallace Berrie, Applause and Schleich have always been well-known for their beautiful, colorful and detailed displays. Another fact that makes these collectibles so outstanding is that "Peyo's" designs and artwork are exceptionally beautiful.

We have featured a number of displays in recent and past issues: please be assured that we will continue to feature these items. If you have a display item in your collection that you would like to see featured in the Newsletter please send us a photo, photocopy and a complete description of the item. Thanks in advance.

What makes Smurf Display items so interesting? We have asked our members and the consensus seems to be that, because we remember seeing Smurf displays in shops years ago and are "kicking ourselves" for not asking our local shop-keepers to give them to us when they were no longer needed, they are all the more attractive now.

We predict that "ADVERTISING MEMORABILIA" will continue to be a very HOT collectible in the future. It is a field of collecting that was established some 37 years ago but will peak in the coming years. The Club has focused on this topic, but mainly used the term "PROMOTIONAL ITEMS." See all of our back-issue Newsletters for more about Smurf Advertising (promotional) items. Stay tuned for more!

Some of my friends have returned from a European vacation. They purchased figurines for me that I cannot identify. They appear to be strange in comparison to my other Smurf figurines. My friends could not get any information about these figures when they purchased them. I guess it is best to send them along to the Club for you to see so I can find out what they are! Thanks in advance.

Dear Andy,

You are correct in stating these Smurf figurines are "Strange!" They are "Pirated" (counterfeit) Smurf figurines made by a European manufacturer in the early 80's. Production of this line of figurines was stopped by "Peyo."

We have verified that a number of different figurines were produced.

1. Smurfette holding an accordian.
2. Smurf holding a candle.
3. A peg-leg Pirate Smurf with a sword.
4. Smurf holding a bottle out to his right side.
5. Smurfette holding a bouquet of daisies.
6. Smurfette with a basket under her arm.
7. A reclining Smurf with Pink shoes and tie.
8. Smurf holding a top hat in one hand and a rabbit in the other.
9. Smurf with a Soccer Ball at his side.

Over the years we have received a report that these Smurfs were made in Spain but this we have been unable to verify.

There may be other figurines by this manufacturer but the ones we have listed we have verified.

If you ever run across one of these, you will know at once they are "Pirated". It is very obvious!

WORLD CUP SOCCER GAMES

In 1978, the West German manufacturer of Smurf figurines introduced figurine #20035, Soccer Player. In the same year the World Cup Soccer Games were played. In recognition of the 1978 games, Schleich produced numerous Soccer Player Smurfs in various uniform colors to represent the different teams.

I think we can safely say, after a sixteen-year investigation that #20035, Soccer Player Smurf, has more paint variations than any other figurine.

We would now like to give you our findings. As no one collector has every variation in his or her collection, this information has been compiled with the help of our vast membership. All paint variations have been verified as being owned by our members.

FACTS: All Soccer Player Smurfs have black shoes.
 Variations in black paint shades have been noted.
 Some have dull black paint, some have high-gloss black paint.
 Figurines painted in Portugal (gold paint dot) usually have dull black paint.
 All have white soccer balls.
 Variations will be found in the groove pattern on the balls.
 Some molds have a pegged foot that holds the ball in place.
 Others have the soccer ball glued to the tip of their shoe.
 It has been noted that there are variations in the position of the figurine's left arm.
 Some arms appear to be more straight forward, while others appear to be out to the side.
 Our investigation shows this to be a mold variation, not just pressure movement discussed previously.
 There were a few molds produced with cleats on the bottom of the Soccer Shoes.

The ORIGINAL ISSUE #20035 Soccer Smurf had Red Socks, Yellow Pants, Red Shirt!!!







#20174 Papa w/Book

All figurines are Red Injected molds!

1. Red feet, pants and hat. Tan book with black "Magic" lettering. Red bookmark. Inside of book has black lines.
2. Same as above except the "Magic" lettering is a thicker and darker lettering.
3. Same as #1 and #2 except "Magic" does not appear on outside of book.
4. Dull orangy/red feet, pants and hat. Ivory book with red "Magic" lettering. Ivory bookmark. Inside of book has black, actual math.
5. Same as #4 except "Magic" does not appear on outside of book.

1. All wood details, feet, ears, nose etc. are very shiny medium brown.
2. All wood details, feet, ears, nose etc. are a lighter, duller brown.

#20176 St. Patrick

1. Green injected mold. Green shoes with yellow outlines on shoe buckle. Orange socks, bow tie, and hat band. Green jacket and hat. Light green shirt and shamrock. Yellow button on shirt. Light brown stick.
2. Blue injected mold. Black shoes with yellow outlines on shoe buckle. White socks. Red bow tie, pants and bow tie, red hat band with yellow outline on buckle. Light brown jacket and shamrock stem, stick. Light green shamrock. Black hat.
3. Same as #2, no red hat band. All paint shades are slightly darker than #2

#20177 Thanksgiving Smurf

1. Medium brown shoes, turkey. White pants, cuffs and collar on jacket. Orange plate. Dark grey jacket and hat. Yellow belt, hat band and bow on shoes.
2. Darker brown shoes, turkey. White pants, cuffs and collar on jacket. Red plate. Dark grey jacket and hat. Yellow belt, hat band, and bow on shoes.
3. Same as #2 except jacket and hat are a lighter grey.

#20178 Tracker

1. White pants and hat. Bright red feather in hat. Shiny dark brown stick
2. Same as #1, Stick is a lighter brown, dull paint.
