

As discussed in our last Newsletter, we have been reviewing and working on the translation of the Kinder-egg German Price Guide issued last year.

We are glad to report that our Club Newsletters have been almost completely thorough in covering the Kinder-egg Smurf figurines and a few other **Smurfy** Kinder-egg items.

See our back-issue Newsletters No.9, No.15, No.17 and No. 25, for Club articles on **Ferrero Kinder-Eggs**.

In this Newsletter we are updating the above-mentioned articles with a few items we omitted.

"A LITTLE HISTORY"

The First Kinder-Egg was produced in the mid 1960's. Known in Germany as "Uberraschung Eiers" (Surprise Eggs).

Plastic figures about 1" in size, were their first issues. Approximately 30 different series of cartoon characters, consisting of ten plastic figurines in each set, have been produced. Metal figurines were also made. Following these, self-assembled plastic toys...cars, trains, planes, boats, etc. were produced. Little puzzles were also manufactured and packed inside the Kinder-Eggs.

Some of the toys came with a photo sheet of all the toys in the series. See our previous articles for samples of these sheets. These sheets add value to the items and are highly sought after as well.

Why have these kinder-Eggs never appeared in the U.S.? Simply stated, a toy inside candy violates U.S. Food & Safety regulations and is banned in the U.S.A. Ferrero does distribute other candies etc. in the U.S. Have you noticed who makes Tic Tacs?

As for our investigation into the reported fact that prices in Europe are 2 to 3 times higher than the price guide values from 1993, we have been, as yet, unable to prove this to be true. Our European staff reports the following:

1. All Ferrero Kinder-egg Toys are showing up at Flea Markets.
2. Mint condition figurines, complete with all pieces and stickers have become increasingly difficult to locate.
3. The 1988 series of Smurf Soccer Players should bear stickers on their shirts. Don't be fooled; without these they are worth less. This is a little-known fact, as many collectors did not realize they should have stickers. You heard it from your Club first! See our original article. Also, be aware that some of these Soccer Players came with separate Soccer Balls.
4. Of highest value is the 1990 Series, as these figurines were snap-to-gether Smurfs with stickers for eyes. The Price Guide listed prices for these, translated into dollars from DM at \$13 to \$14 each. These prices do not take into account the reports of prices being 2 to 3 times higher today than the 1993 published prices.


On the second page of the above mentioned article, we showed three early Kinder-Egg Smurf figurines. At that time little was known about this series.

We are now pleased to up-date this information!

This Smurf Figurine Series was called **Olympiade der Schlumpfe** (Olympics for the Smurfs). It was produced in 1983, and there were eight figurines in this series.

1. Eierlauf-Schlumpf (Egg Race Smurf).
2. Hupf-Schlumpfinchen (Jumping Smurfette).
3. Such-Schlumpf (Search Smurf).
4. Sackhupf-Schlumpf (Sack Race Smurf).
5. Negerkub-Schlumpf (Sorry, we don't care to print translation)
6. Schiri-Schlumpf (Schiri? Papa Smurf blowing whistle).
7. Steizen-Schlumpf (Stilts Smurf).
8. Hupfball-Schlumpf (Hop Ball Smurf).

Shown below is the complete series. One interesting fact we should mention is that Numbers 1, 2, and 7 are quoted in the price guide at 700 DM. These three numbers have separate parts! These are very, very, rare!




Kinder-Maxi Egg Surprise

The price guide is incomplete on this series. The guide does not show nor mention the Airplane with Smurf that was in this promotion and we featured.


The guide does, however, show TWO Smurf houses; only one was shown in our original article. See both houses below:


Also in 1988, we noted in the price guide that Ferrero produced a display Soccer Field to use with the Soccer Player figurines. See Below:



NO MENTION OF FERRERO!! ONLY IMPs!!

All twelve of the Smurf Figurines produced by Ferrero in the 1990 series are put together (snapped together) complete with stickers and are displayed inside the box in their own individual compartments!

COLLECTORS' COMMENTS...

Dear S.C.C.I.,

I enjoy reading about other collectors in the Club. So I would like to share my collecting story with the Club members!

My dad started buying Smurfs for me when I was a baby. They used to be my favorite thing to play with and my parents thought they were cute. My parents later went on vacation to Los Angeles. They found a store called the "Smurf Store" on Hollywood Boulevard that sold nothing but Smurf memorabilia. They bought as many Smurfs as they could.

When I got a little older, whenever I played with my Smurfs, I always used to lose them. My parents say they would spend hours looking for them all. Once they found Shiver Smurf in a heating vent. Fortunately, none of my Smurfs were ever permanently lost and very few were damaged.

My parents and I would always look in our local toy stores to see if there were any new Smurfs. Eventually, we could no longer find Smurfs anywhere. We thought that the Smurfs had been discontinued because the only Smurfs we knew of were the Smurfs listed on the Schleich poster "Here we are everyone of us." The Smurfs we had that were not on the poster we thought were a few made after the poster was produced. We always kept our eyes open for more of these figures. One day when we were at a antique sale we saw Smurfs. So we know look at antique sales for Smurfs.

Dear Jodi & all members who have asked about the "Blue Moon Poster,"

You have brought a point to our attention that is very important as of late. We now have numerous collectors in the S.C.C.I. that did not start collecting Smurfs until 1985 and later. We realize from your letter, and many others that we have received, that we have to back-up a bit, we also see that not all of our collectors started collecting in the late 70's and early 80's. Also, with our vast increase of European members not as familiar with the Wallace Berrie, American Market line, we should devote some additional Newsletter articles to these issues.

The "Blue Moon Poster" by Wallace Berrie (featured on next page) was issued in 1983/84. It shows their line of 2" Smurf figurines from December 1978 to 1984. They issued this poster with their 6000 series numbers which we do publish in our Club Identification Catalog. We, the S.C.C.I., do not use these numbers as they are far from complete and are not representative of the complete line of 2" Smurf Figurines, Super Smurfs, Playsets etc. The Schleich numbering system is complete!

As long as we are on the Topic of the "Blue Moon Poster" this is a good time to call everyone's attention to the fact that there are two errors on this poster!




The "Blue Moon Poster" is in full color and measures 26" by 17". On the bottom of the poster (not shown) is a listing of each figurine's number (6000 series), name, whether it is retired (*R), date issued in the U.S. Please keep in mind that the Wallace Berrie issue dates are not the original issue dates. The S.C.C.I. Identification Guide has the ORIGINAL ISSUE DATES from Schleich. The FIRST 2" Smurf Figurine was issued in 1965, not December, 1978!

OMO LAUNDRY DETERGENT

PROMOTION

FROM FRANCE

Does everyone remember our article in Newsletter 4, Spring 1987, and Newsletter 6, Fall 1987, in which we discussed the "OMO Laundry Detergent" Promotional (Advertising) 2" Smurf figurines?

One of the figurines discussed was Smurf #20136 holding a "OMO" box of detergent (see box below, actual size).



We also discussed other promotional (advertising) figurines produced for "OMO" by Schleich in the aforementioned articles.

We have now been informed, by a member in France, that a series of 1" PVC Smurf figurines was produced for the "OMO" Laundry Detergent promotion. These little all blue Smurf figurines are embossed with "OMO" on their heads.

It has not been verified as to how many of these figurines were inside a single box of detergent, nor how many different Smurfs and Smurfettes were represented.

We have verified that the following thirteen different figurines with "OMO" embossed on their heads were produced:


COUNTER DISPLAYS

The very first Counter Displays produced by Wallace Berrie & Co. for the American Market were made of Corrugated Cardboard.


Featured below is display D-83, this features a beautiful full color photograph of the Smurfs and the Smurf Village. The display holds 12 dozen Smurfs and room to feature the Smurf Houses. It is 19" high, 24" wide, 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " deep.



This Super Smurf display D-63, also features colorful Smurf artwork. It displays 72 Super Smurfs and is 17" high, 16 $\frac{1}{4}$ " wide, 9" deep.



The Olympian Super Smurf display featured below was produced as a Special Presentation. It held 72 Olympian Super Smurfs and is 18" high, 16 $\frac{1}{4}$ " wide, 9" deep.





COUNTER DISPLAYS


Within a few short months of the Smurfs introduction in the United States, January 1979, Wallace Berrie announced that the Smurf's success was **instantaneous!** The number one character in the U.S. for 1980 was the Smurfs!

Retailers were clearing out their shops, devoting large sections of their shops to **SMURFS!**


Wallace Berrie now realized Corrugated Cardboard Smurf Displays were out!

In 1980, Wallace Berrie began producing **molded Plastic Smurf** Display cases for 2" Smurf Figurines and Super Smurfs. These were available to retail stores only and not produced for collectors to purchase! As you will note, many of these displays were designed to either sit on a counter top or mounted on a wall. The swivel counter displays were strictly for counter tops.


This was the 1St. Super Case in Plastic 1980

Swivel Counter Top






COUNTER DISPLAYS

This plastic display case for 2" Smurf figurines, number D-51 was, without a doubt, the most popular of all display cases. How many of us attempted to purchase one from our favorite Smurf retailer? Unfortunately, by 1985/86 when the shops were ready to part with them, the front plastic covers were either missing or in poor condition.

The swivel display #D-59, featured above, was enhanced in 1982. It was designed as a floor display with revolving showcase. The bins below were sectioned and could hold six 2" figurines each, up to 90 designs.




Exhibit A

Important features:

1. Paint fills space between head and arm.
2. Antenna is plastic, inserted between fingers.
3. Antenna is approx. 1" long w/knob at top.
4. Thumb does not touch waist.

Country Marking: W. Germany

Exhibit B

Important features:

1. Head tilts a bit to the right; headphone, therefore, does not touch arm.
2. Antenna is between fingers; may be part of the mold.
3. Antenna is short w/o knob at top.
4. Thumb does not touch waist.

Country Marking: W. Germany



Exhibit C

Important features:

1. Space between face and arm is open.
2. Headphone touches arm.
3. Antenna is between fingers; appears to be part of the mold.
4. Antenna is topped with a little knob.
5. Thumb does not touch waist.

Country Marking: W. Germany

Exhibit D

Important features:

1. Open space between face and arm.
2. Arm thicker than exhibits A,B,& C.
3. Antenna is part of mold, it is alongside arm and extends up from elbow.
4. Thumb is joined to waist (possibly only by paint).

Country Marking: Hong Kong
