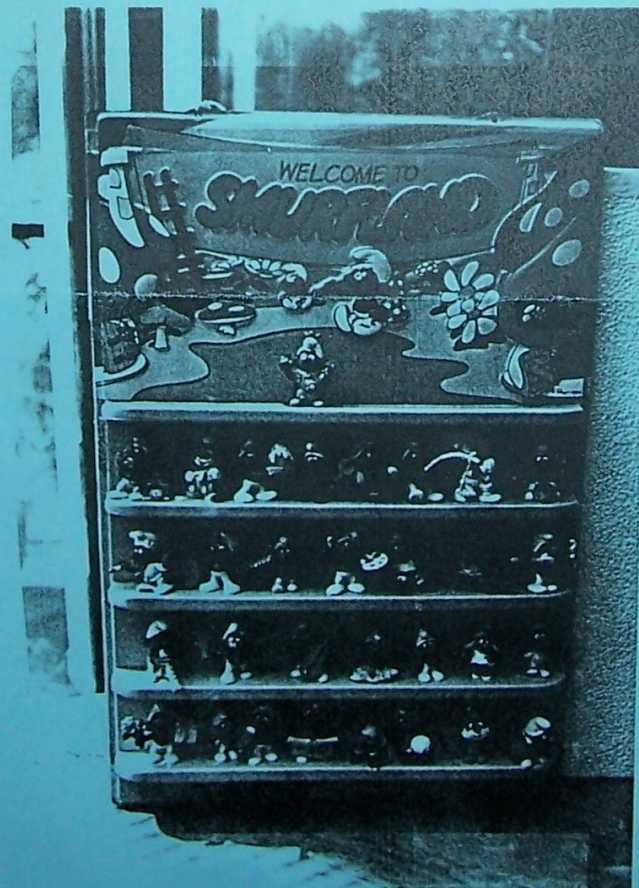
FROM THE NETHERLANDS

It measures 24" by 16" (61 by 40 CM) and will display approximately forty, 2" Smurf figurines.

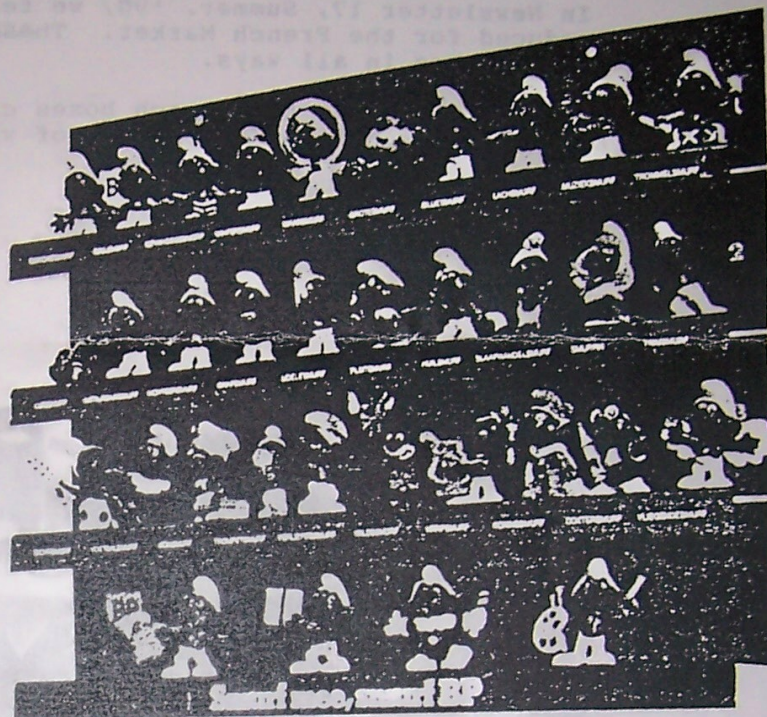
Once again we report that the popularity of Smurf Displays is in part due to the beautiful, colorful, artwork. In this case the top of the display is marvelous!

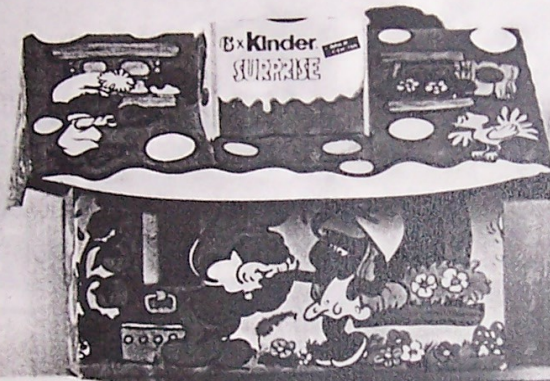
We have been informed that the Ferrero Kinder Egg Promotion in England is very unique! All of their cartoon characters were marketed in these delightful and colorful houses called

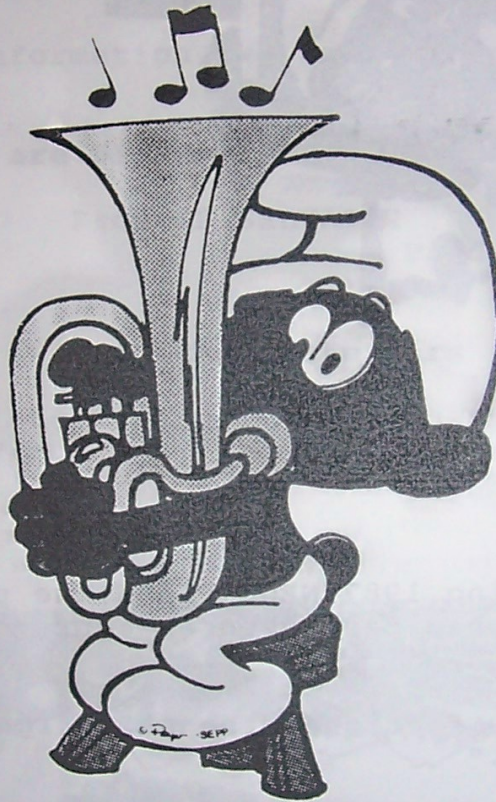

COLLECTORS' COMMENTS

My Reunion with the Smurfs

The Smurfs reentered my life because I had writers' block.

I had to write a 1,000-word feature article for my Public Relations Feature Writing class, and, frankly, I was low on great ideas. In desperation, I finally decided to do a humorous piece on the new variety of M&M candies. What did people think of the blue M&M, peanut butter M&M, and almond M&M? Was there still a fan club for the red M&M?

My professor suggested that I look through the *Encyclopedia of Associations*. She pointed out that if there was an M&M fan club, the *Encyclopedia* would probably list it. In the worst case, I might find another intriguing organization to profile. So, off to the nearest library I went.

The *Encyclopedia* turned out to be a gold mine of ideas. One page alone offered the American Carousel Society, American Cat Association, and the Ancient and Honourable Order of Small Castle Owners of Great Britain. I kept browsing the "Hobby and Avocational Organization" section, and then something caught my eye: SMURF COLLECTORS' CLUB INTERNATIONAL (SCCI), founded by Suzanne Lipschitz and based in local Massapequa, New York!

Here was an intriguing story. I remembered the Smurf craze of the early-to-mid 80's, my late childhood — becaped Smurfs and Smurfettes in the stores, in friends' homes, on TV, and everywhere else. I hadn't thought about the Smurfs in years. Yet a decade later, there was an organization of over 900 people who were devoted to collecting and displaying Smurf memorabilia. What appeal drew these members to the Smurfs? Had the Smurfs really been around since 1957 or 1958?

Few people would be better qualified to answer these questions than Suzanne Lipschitz, so I called her. Suzanne explained that to Smurf fans, the little blue gnomes represent cuteness and nonviolence. Moreover, Smurf Collectors' Club International actually has over 1,200 members — not 900 — and its members range in age from teenagers and twentysomethings to senior citizens.

Eventually, Suzanne suggested, "If you really want to understand these collectibles, why not look at my collection?" So, I did.

To a non-collector, the variety of Smurf characters was mind-boggling. In their glass display cases, Smurfs and Smurfettes painted, typed at computers, played bagpipes, climbed trees, and ice skated. There were Graduating Smurfs, Brides and Grooms, angels and devils, monks, even a black-garbed chimney sweep. I least expected to see four Knight Smurfs carrying pikes and wearing gold or bronze helmets!

I have to admit that many of my favorite characters were the mischievous ones. One Baby Smurf from West Germany spilled cereal all over himself. (Haven't we all had sloppy days?) A "Naughty" Smurf stuck out his tongue at the world while wiggling his hands behind his ears. (Haven't we all felt that way from time to time?) Then there was the black Smurf gritting his teeth. (I've had those days myself!)

The best part, for me, was learning about the collectors. As a person with "wanderlust," I especially enjoyed the accounts of their Smurf-hunting trips to England, West Germany, and Hanna-Barbera Land (Ohio). It was impossible not to root for the traveling collectors, and I found myself sulking when they didn't find the pieces they were seeking.

What really impressed me was that in an era when many fashions, fads, and TV shows are dead in a month, these Smurf collectors have been devoted to their Smurf-hunting for five, ten, fifteen years or longer. Suzanne told me about collectors who own entire roomfuls of Smurf figurines, games, comic books, puppets, toys, souvenirs . . . How did these members find the time and patience to track all the pieces down, especially since Smurf collectibles are no longer produced in the United States? More important, how did they find the room? It was inspirational.

Incidentally, I submitted my finished feature story on August 10, 1995 — and received an "A" in Public Relations Feature Writing. Thanks, Smurf Collectors!

HEADLINE

"Peyo" can laugh well! With his 150 different Smurfs he magically creates sunshine in the hearts of children and millions to his bank account.

My Smurfs are beating Mickey Mouse!

The Belgian artist "Peyo" with his cute gnomes has declared war with Walt Disney. All of Europe is already Smurfed!

"You want to know why there are only male Smurfs? Very simple: Smurfettes with their gossip and quarrel mix up the whole male world..." "Peyo" leans back in his black leather armchair, laughs heartily. Then he glances over his gold-framed glasses at his wife and says: "What do you think to that, Janine?" But she offers no opinion and pours coffee.

We are on the Avenue de Boetendal, a fine address in Brussels. In front of us sits Pierre Culliford, better known as the artist "Peyo": The man who created the Smurfs, imaginative creations between man and animal, which only children are crazy about. The man, who loves children above all, and became with this love a millionaire on the side. The man who is called Europe's Walt Disney.

"Peyo" scratches his head while Madame Culliford passes cake. Suddenly he says: "Are these actually male Smurfs that I have been drawing for 20 years? Puzzling, I don't know. I haven't pulled down their little pants and checked it out." The last comment greatly amuses him and he laughs again..."Maybe they are without gender." "Smurfs are Smurfs" says Madame Culliford with authority. Whether they are without gender remains a puzzle. Certain, is that in the House of "Peyo" Madame wears the pants.

One looks back to early Summer in 1958, when in the house of somewhat successful comic artist "Peyo", the arrival of a baby was anticipated. Just for fun the 33 year old artist sat down and drew an imaginary figure. Just so, without much thought. Just as a present for his unborn child. With that the Smurfs were 2 months earlier on this earth than "Peyo's" daughter Veronique. Six weeks after her birth, gourmet food lover "Peyo" invited some other artists to enjoy fresh mussels. "Peyo" showed the drawings and new ideas to them, one was the little man with the big nose and ears. His colleagues were excited!

But, he couldn't think of a name for his creation. Lost in his thoughts "Peyo" made a butter bread sandwich and wanted to add some salt. He said to a friend; "Pass me the...eh...eh...le Schtroumpfs....." Schtroumpfs can be translated as "that something" or "that thing" - The French-speaking Belgians like to use that word when they've forgotten the name. That is how the name was found for the little gnomes.

In Germany it became "Schlumpf," in England "Smurf" in Italy "Puffi" in Spain "Pitufos" etc. But behind the name is always the same gnome, even if now there are 150 different variations. From the Mailman Smurf to the Flute Smurf to Judge Smurf to the Beat-Smurf-Olympic Smurf to Laughing Smurf to Waiter Smurf - everything that children understand is represented.

Since the early 60's, the newest adventures from the land of the Smurfs appear weekly in the comic-newspaper "Spirou." The text and ideas for the drawings are all "Peyo's." As the three-dimensional figurines evolved, success was not avoidable.

Sometimes, when "Peyo" receives a call from the Smurf-factory, Schleich, he still can't believe it (the success). "Please, urgent, two new Smurf ideas are needed. Production in Portugal, and Hong Kong is to capacity. Now we've conquered the market in the Phillipnes. In the U.S.A. in one year, without advertising we've sold four million Smurfs. Where are the designs for the Super Smurfs? Urgently have to fly to New York. " And with each Smurf that sells in the toy shoppe, rings the register for "Peyo." Because on the bottom of each Smurf is printed : Copyright Peyo.

What is the Smurf Philosophy? Non-smoker + non-drinker (alcohol) says it this way: "I have no message. And I am not a moralist. But when one looks (or follows) the nose of the Smurf it is obvious. They (the Smurfs) have succeeded, despite obstacles, in living as a community. Thats why there are no Smurfs with weapons. But why the children love his Smurfs as once the after-war generation loved Mickey Mouse, remains a puzzle to "Peyo." I can't explain it with my mind or thoughts, I've never worked with my head, but with my heart. And thats what I will do until I die. Should my hands fall off first, then I'll draw with my feet."

The 53 year old Smurf-Father doesn't get his ideas from the playground or the kindergarten. He himself, is a grown-up child and refuses to emerge from his fantasy playground. "My wife does the finances, my daughter the organizing, my son gives advice, and 72% income tax is withheld by the Fiskus. My world are the children, and if they enjoy my Smurfs then I am content. It is as simple as that."

Only once did "Peyo" make a mistake. He was designing a Smurf, with slanted eyes, for the Japanese market. But in Japan the great idea of beauty is a face with round, European eyes. "Peyo" sat down and drew a Smurf without slanted eyes. And with that "Peyo" laughed heartily at himself.

From that Smurf - two million were sold in Japan, It's as simple at that!

"LE JOURNAL de MONTREAL"

Through her 350 Smurf characters, a grandmother is finding fulfillment in the "reality" of an imaginary world.

This "Nanny Smurf" knows everything there is to know about the (more than 350) little characters. This is her smurfific story!

Since "Peyo" created the Smurfs comic strip in 1958, the Smurfs have captured the imagination of many a child now grown up and of many an adult enjoying a second childhood. Take Smurf collector Anne, owner of one of the most impressive collections of Smurf memorabilia - more than 10,000 articles of all types, including 8,000 figurines. She takes the collection to exhibits far and wide, sustaining the awe and admiration of visitors.

Ten years ago, her first grandchild (the first of four) was born. "While doing my grocery shopping, I happened to buy a Papa Smurf, the first piece of my collection. Of course, like everyone else, I'd read some Smurf cartoons, but I had no idea that I would go overboard one day," says this charming Repentigny resident.

Without too much knowledge, she began picking up Smurf items here and there, selling duplicate pieces in the flea market of Saint-Eustache. "Then one day, a gentleman approached and told me about his own collection. He invited me to his home and there, I literally fell in love with the fellows. Two years later, I bought his collection instead of financing a trip to Spain. I have never regretted that decision," recalls Anne.

Friends bring her Smurfs from all over the world, and Anne herself finds them on trips or in flea markets. As a result, she now has 8,000 figurines and 2,000 other Smurf collectibles in her home, numbered, tagged and arranged neatly in boxes. Anne admits that she still needs many Smurfy items.

"Peyo's" albums (including the memorable Johan et Pirlouit and Benoit Brisefer) were translated into twenty-two languages before his death in 1992. Anne however, never met the man.

Anne also owns 140 of the 256 episodes of the Smurfs television cartoon on video. Her husband of thirty-nine years, Roger, never ceases to encourage her in her collecting. "After all," Anne says, "this requires a lot of organization, especially when it's time to lug all those boxes to the exhibits!"

She won the "Best Exhibit" prize at the most recent "Hobby Show" at Place Bonaventure. Anne asserts, "My Smurf displays impress kids and adults alike. At the exhibit, visitors from England were said to be flabbergasted when they saw them. You know, these little people, who each have their own personality, are as beautiful as Disney World's Mickey Mouse."

The Smurfs, born in a forest near Brussels, Belgium, are an integral part of the lives of Anne and her four grandchildren. When the kids visit her house, they never have reason to be bored!

There's the beloved giant Smurf telephone, the collectible which is dearest to her heart. We haven't even mentioned yet the giant hockey rink (complete with players and spectators), the giant Puppies, Smurf buttons....

Anne explains proudly, "It's fun to see kids reactions. They believe in this. They identify with these characters."

At the time of the interview, Anne was occupied with "smurfing up" her suitcases; by the time you read these lines, she will be somewhere in Greece with Roger, no doubt in search of little Smurfs.

The Smurfs are an imaginary world, to be sure - but how real they are in the everyday existence of this grandmother bordering on Smurfism, for whom the Smurferies of life are now without number!
